At "Lord, I have called...," 6 Stikhera: **3 Stikhera of the Martyrs, in Tone 8:** *To the melody, "O most glorious wonder...."* O greatly <u>suffering martyr</u>, / Blessèd Onesíphorus, / Thou didst bear torments for confessing Christ God. / First, enduring wounds made by the lawless in the court / Then being condemned to the flames; / Through this, earning thy crown of victory /// Given thee by the hand of the Creator, O all-praised one. O greatly suffering martyr Porphyrius! / Thy blood hast colored thy robes in the purple of porphyry. / Being thus arrayed in splendid apparel, O glorious one, / Thou dost reign together with our One True God / By the grace and power of the Spirit. /// Beseech Him now that we all may be saved. O most glorious martyrs! / You were slain in a sacred manner for the Life of all — / Rejoicing, you were stretched out on a searing grill / And dragged by horses around the arena. / Thus you achieved a blessèd end / And are rightly glorified. /// O ever-blessèd ones, ceaselessly pray for us all. And 3 Stikhera of the Venerable Matrona, in Tone 4: To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...." Thou didst quell the longings of thy flesh, O Matrona, / Through thy pious and heroic abstinence. / Thou didst follow in the steps of Christ / Coming to live with thy fellow ascetics / Quenching the flames of passion with showers of thy divine tears /// Kindling in their place a most-fervent desire for the Creator;

The General Troparion of the Martyrs, in Tone 4:
Thy martyrs, O Lord, /
Through their sufferings received their incorruptible crowns from Thee, our God /
For having Thy strength they laid low their enemies /
